Swissmint is honouring the achievements of the brave rescue dog with a 50-franc gold coin. Visit a descendant of Barry I on Saturday, 28 October 2017, from 2pm to 3pm at the Swissmint stand in the International Coin Fair in the Swissotel, Zurich-Oerlikon and have your photo taken with him.

At the same time as the Barry coin, this year's trial minting of the yodel coin will be issued in a mintage of only 600 units. Due to the anticipated high demand, the amount available to purchase will be limited.

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THE SAINT BERNARD DOG BARRY The most famous rescue dog in the hospice

The hospice stands on the Swiss side of the Great Saint Bernard Pass, the connection between Switzerland and Italy, where Napoleon was once able to recover from his campaigns. On the pass, which is 2,469 metres above sea level, canons bred St. Bernard dogs initially as load carriers and later as avalanche rescue dogs. Barry, probably the most well-known dog, apparently saved many people from the white death.

Origin

In the 11th century, canons founded a hospice as a refuge for travellers and pilgrims on the 2,469 metre-high Great Saint Bernard Pass. Large mountain dogs have been kept at the hospice since the mid-17th century to guard and protect those staying there. The first visual evidence of the presence of mountain dogs dates back to 1695, and the first written document is a hospice memo from the year 1707. The dogs were rapidly adopted as companion dogs and above all as rescue dogs for travellers who lost their way in the snow and mist. The dogs from the Great Saint Bernard Pass saved the lives of a great number of people. The reputation of the Saint Bernards (then called "Barry dogs") grew throughout Europe in the 19th century thanks to chronicles published in many languages and to reports passed on by word of mouth by the soldiers who had crossed the pass with Napoleon Bonaparte in 1800. The legendary Barry became the archetypal rescue dog.

The direct ancestors of the Saint Bernards were the large farm dogs found widely across the area. In the space of a few generations, these dogs were bred according to specifically defined ideal criteria to make them into the breed that exists today. In 1867, Heinrich Schumacher from Holligen near Bern became the first person to present documents showing the ancestry of his dogs.

In February 1884, the Swiss dog register was started. The first ever entry was a Saint Bernard called Léon, and the 28 additional entries were all Saint Bernards too. The Swiss Saint Bernard Club was founded in Basel on 15 March 1884. On the occasion of an international cynology congress on 2 June 1887, the Saint Bernard was officially recognised as a Swiss dog breed and compulsory standards were set for the breed. The Saint Bernard has been regarded as Switzerland's national dog ever since.

The story of the legendary Barry I

Barry lived at the hospice from 1800 until 1812 and was doubtless the most famous of all the dogs that ever provided rescue services on the pass. He saved the lives of more than 40 people. The many legends surrounding his name greatly contributed to the Saint Bernard's good reputation. As a result, there is always a dog called Barry at the hospice. In 1812, when Barry started to grow old, he was brought to Bern by a priest. He was well taken care of in his new home but finally died of old age two years later. In 1815, he was put on show in the Natural History Museum. The restored stuffed body of Barry I has been displayed there since 1923.

The Barry Foundation

Following its founding in January 2005, the Barry Foundation took over the breeding kennels from Maison Hospitalière du Grand-St-Bernard (Holy Order of the Great Saint Bernard Monastery) together with the kennel's famous Saint Bernard dogs. The foundation has been the owner of the 300-year-old breed since April 2005, and is thus the world's oldest and most important breeding centre for the Swiss national dog. In accordance with the Great





Saint Bernard tradition, the foundation predominantly breeds short-haired dogs. Only a minority of the Saint Bernard dogs are long-haired. Around 20 pedigree puppies are born at the breeding kennels each year. A team consisting of ten professionally trained dog keepers, a vet and a breed specialist look after the well-being and the optimal development of the Saint Bernards and ensure a professional approach to training. The foundation is committed to the continued existence of the legendary Saint Bernard dog and the preservation of the special type of hospice dog. Barryland – museum and Saint Bernard dogs

Barryland in Martigny is a meeting place that brings together people and the Saint Bernards from the Great Saint Bernard Pass. The lively museum presents a range of works of art and objects that have marked the history of the hospice and the Great Saint Bernard Pass. This heritage is brought to life by a modern, interactive exhibition that immortalises the universal symbolism of Saint Bernards. The famous hospice dogs are the special attraction. The ground floor consists of the kennels, boxes and an area for looking after the dogs. The boxes lead out to the outdoor enclosure, where the Saint Bernards can romp around freely while visitors look on. The museum is open daily from 10am to 6pm (closed on 24 and 25 December)

The Saint Bernard as a breed

The Saint Bernard has a friendly, affectionate nature. It is intelligent, good-natured and reliable; also in contact with children it is generally unproblematic. It has a quiet temperament but can also be lively and playful well into old age. A certain stubbornness is common. Saint Bernards are vigilant and have a certain protective instinct. The Saint Bernard is a good watchdog as well as family and companion dog. However, it is less suited to fast, sporting activities. In hot weather, it will seek out a cool place to rest. Even today, Saint Bernards are used as search and rescue dogs. Life expectancy is about 8–12 years. Further information is available at www.barryswiss.ch.

Born in 1949 in Bern and grew up in Köniz, Maya Delaquis trained at the Bern School of Arts and Crafts to become a graphic artist with a federal diploma. She also studied under Heinz Jost, the well-known poster designer. Well known for her versatility and diligence, in 1970 she received the federal award for applied art for her scientific drawings. She taught as a lecturer in book illustration and animal drawing for nine years at the Bern School of Design. Animals, in particular dogs, have always been dear to the heart of the international show judge for 37 breeds of dog. Posters, illustrations and texts were created in magazines and books. Her bestseller "Finn and the Bernese Bear" was published In 2012, in 2013

TRIAL MINTING "YODELLING" The soul-stirring sound of Switzerland

On a bright sunny day, the 30th Swiss Yodelling Festival took place in Brig-Glis from 22 to 25 June 2017. Yodellers, Alpine horn players and flag-swingers provided the 150,000 visitors with a colourful programme indeed of traditional songs and alphorn pieces with a variety of different performances and presentations. The highlight was the festival procession on Sunday afternoon, which showcased the wide variety of traditions. On 4 May 2017, Swissmint launched a 20-franc silver commemorative coin to honour yodelling.

Our engraver and employees in tool production and in minting are confronted with big challenges in the production process of each commemorative coin. Before the serial production of a coin can be started, a so-called trial minting is carried out. It may well be that certain design features cannot be sufficiently stamped or planned sanding does not achieve the desired result on individual spots. Instead of these trial mintings being rejected, Swissmint distributes these essai coins among collectors once a year. The reverse side of the coin bears the letter "E" as an identification mark which stands for "essai" or trial minting, as well as a small Swiss cross in a circle: This limited edition is supplied in a small, anthracite-coloured cardboard box (there is no numbered certificate of authenticity).

In the trial minting of the yodelling coin, the two yodellers and the lettering are more matt than in the regular minting and the cross on the flag of the flag swinger is matt instead of shiny.

Order process

The trial minting coin issue is limited. The quantity which can be ordered is limited to three units per customer or delivery address. Swissmint reserves the right to make further reductions. The sales launch will take place on 14 September 2017 at 8am. No reservations can be accepted or taken into account.

DESIGN: GABRIEL GIGER

Gabriel Giger was born in 1981. Before starting his apprenticeship in graphic design, he attended a preparation



course at the Valais cantonal school of art (ECAV) in Sierre. Having gained professional experience in Vancouver, he then worked as Junior Art Director at advertising agency GGK Zürich while at the same time attending the ADC/BSW Kreativschule (Ad School) and training as a creative concept developer. With this experience in the field of advertising, he returned to Valais in 2008 to open his own graphic design studio in Leuk-Stadt. His work includes corporate design, poster and advertising campaigns, illustrations and comics. As a well-known cartoonist for the Walliser Bote newspaper he has caricatured political events in Valais since 2009 and also draws for Nebelspalter

magazine and other publications. Since 2012 he has taken part in the exhibition of the top Swiss press illustrators in Bern and has received multiple awards. His book "Nid ganz hundart!" VISIT OF FEDERAL **COUNCILLOR MAURER**

The visit of a member of the Federal Council to the Federal Mint is a rare occurrence and the flying visit of the Finance Minister Ueli Maurer on 27 April 2017 was one of the high points of the year. He could scarcely hide the fact that he was obviously very much at ease in the "money factory".

It is well known that the schedule of a Federal Councillor is heavily booked and it is not unusual that an appointment fixed long in advance has to be cancelled or postponed for topical reasons. Federal Councillor Ueli Maurer's visit, the big boss at Swissmint, had already been announced last autumn, some people began to wonder if he would come at all.

He did come. Accompanied by Serge Gaillard, Director of the Federal Finance Administration FFA. After the welcome address by Swissmint Director Marius Haldimann and general information about Swissmint, there followed the tour of the mint. The Technical Manager Ronnie Mocker and the Commercial Manager Urs Liechti presented their areas of responsibility. Firstly, the receiving inspection area was visited where samples of the coin blanks received are examined to see if there are no faults in terms of weight, dimensions and quality.

This was followed by the destruction mill where damaged, discoloured and dirty coins are rolled out. This blatant destruction of capital was probably painful for the finance minister torn by cost-cutting rounds. However, he did not betray his feelings. The visit continued to planchet preparation, where the delivered planchets are cleaned in a pickling bath and washed for the collector's coins.

The minting of the collectors' coins and above all the circulation coins fascinated the Federal Councillor and he was probably dreaming about reducing the government deficit with the freshly minted coins. The rolling and packaging machine with its conveyer belts and packaging robots is reminiscent of a Luna Park amusement park, also made an impression on him.

After the dispatch department and information on the topic of collector's coins the visit led on to tool production under the expert guidance of the person responsible Manfred Schober. Particular interest was taken in the creation of the virtual,

> three-dimensional milling templates by the engraver with the aid of which the coin dies are produced.

After this foray into the world of physical money, Federal Councillor Ueli Maurer must once again dedicate himself to the dry subject of book money and thereby keep an eye on maintaining a balanced federal budget and complying with the debt brake.

Corrigendum

The "Fairgold" article in the January 2017 issue of "Heads or tails" might give the impression that our gold coins are available in Fairtrade certified gold. What is correct is that the gold used by Swissmint meets the requirements of the Chain-of-Custody Standard issued by the Responsible Jewellery Council. In accordance with this standard, Swissmint guarantees the traceability of the (recycled) gold used. In the case of Fairtrade gold, this is gold from small-scale business mining. The certified mines work to ensure the protection of people and the environment.

Password changes in swissmintshop.ch

Our online shop is operated by the Federal Office of Information Technology, Systems and Telecommunication (FOITT) and is thus subject to the high security standards of the Federal Administration. This is why a change of password is required every three months. After a number of unsuccessful login attempts with the old password around the issue date, there is a surge in the automatic requests for a new password. It can take some time for the system to process the various requests to reset passwords. We would therefore ask you to wait a while after requesting the new password before you log on with the new password.
